Re: Simplified Telecommunication Tax

Any Municipality with a population of less than 500,000 which attempts to impose, amend or repeal the Simplified Municipal Telecommunication tax must file a certified copy of such ordinance with the Illinois Department of Revenue prior to March 20, or September 20. Ordinances received prior to March 20 will be collected on or after the following July 1. Ordinances received prior to September 20 will be collected on or after the following January 1. 35 ILCS 636/5-20.

City Council passed Ordinance 07-3604 on September 10, 2007 to increase the Simplified Municipal Telecommunication Tax from 3% to 5% giving the overall rate including the State Telecommunication Excise Tax rate at 12%. The state collects 7%. An additional 1% increase would give the city an additional average of \$5,500 a month or \$66,000 a year. The increase to an individual's bill would only be \$0.50 to \$1.15 a month based on the number of phones they have per household and their contract with their cellular provider.

If we do want to increase the Simplified Municipal Telecommunication tax, I will Present an Ordinance for the Council to consider at the August 27th Council Meeting and have the Ordinance to the State by September 20.

A public hearing is not required to pass this ordinance.
